Children's Centre Crèche gets new name

THE crèche provision at the Children's Centre has changed its name.

To avoid confusion with the Pre-School and The Co-operative Childcare Nursery users were asked to suggest new names. A short list of four names was drawn up and voting took place in March. 43 votes were cast and 20 of these were for Bumblebees @ Rose Hill.

Bumblebees@Rose

Hill is open Monday to Thursday term time only, providing childcare for adult education course participants and some sessions for children under the "Two-Year Old Entitlement" scheme.

Did you know you may be entitled to up to 15 hours free education and childcare under the Government "Two-Year Old Entitlement" scheme?

From April 2013 more

children will meet the criteria and be able to access free places in Nurseries and Pre-Schools around the country.

Some childminders can also accept children on this scheme. Places are offered in settings or with childminders deemed to be of good or outstanding quality.

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
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






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

AFTER working as a PCSO in Rose Hill since May 2007, Frauke Eicker is moving on.

In the six years Frauke has been based in Rose Hill, she has seen a huge change in the community. Frauke said: "In the first couple of years of working here, we had a dispersal order in operation and six ASBOS in Rose Hill, but we've had no new ones issued since 2009."

Frauke believes that a combination of increased police presence, input from the council and the Rose Hill Regeneration Project, is the reason behind Rose Hill's success.

She said: "They haven't just focused on creating new building, they've

improved the community."

"My fondest memory of Rose Hill is possibly the first Christmas event organised by Fran Gardner. From having gangs of youths congregate and cause lowlevel crime, to seeing all sorts of ages and members of the community gather together in a peaceful way was fantastic. For me, that summed up how much the estate has changed for the better."

Frauke has worked in Rose Hill for six years, and will leave her job at the end of June to continue in her work as a PCSO, but in a different role at Oxford Brookes.

Keeping children fit and healthy!

DO YOU know how much exercise your child should get?

Exercise has many benefits for children. Not only is it enjoyable but it helps them grow healthily and is good for their development. It can also reduce their risk of becoming overweight when older which is associated with developing illnesses like heart disease. Exercise can also help your child's social skills and ability to mix with others.

The amount of exercise a child should undertake varies according to their age. For all children under the age of five, NHS professionals recommend limiting sedentary (sitting) activities, apart from sleeping, such as watching TV or being in a buggy for a long time. The advice for those under five who can walk without help is to exercise daily for at least three hours over the whole day. This can be inside or outside.

Both light activities such as walking slowly or standing up and energetic activities such as running or riding a bike count. For children under five who cannot walk the advice is to get them active with floor-based play or water-based play in safe environments from birth. This can include play when they are lying on their stomachs

or what's called "tummy time" or for parent and baby swimming classes. If your child is overweight and under five the above guidelines are still helpful to follow but they may need to be more active and change their diet in order to keep to a healthy weight.

All the above advice is only a guideline and the Live Well NHS Choices website recommends that children's individual physical and mental capabilities are taken into account.

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ROSE HILL COMMUNITY CENTRE NEW BUILD PROPOSAL (SUBJECT TO FURTHER DEVELOPMENT)





ROSE HILL residents have had several opportunities recently to attend drop-in sessions to view the final plans for the new community centre before the planning application is submitted.

Following extensive consultation with the community and key stakeholders the plans for the proposed building were revised.

The new centre would bring together several facilities under one roof, including a community centre, social club, advice centre, sports pavilion and the youth club. It would be owned by Oxford City Council.

The proposed new community centre would be built on a new site in Rose Hill and could be completed by early 2015, meaning it would be ready to move into before the existing centre is closed.

The location for the new facility is set back from Ashhurst Way on the

site of the current children's playground which will be re-sited and the new building will overlook the recreation ground.








FOR THE past few years, households in Rose Hill have been teaming up to buy good food at cheap prices. By placing large orders at a wholesaler, groups of households can get big discounts on food and household essentials—getting good-quality produce at prices much lower than in the shops.

Stocking up on rice, pasta, spices, beans, tinned-tomatoes, and other staple foods means our kitchen cupboards are never empty, and we never need to carry heavy or bulky bags back from the shops.

It reduces our reliance on supermarkets, and minimises the resources needed to transport food around the country.

Bedroom Tax: What are my options?

SINCE the benefit changes came in on 1 April, residents who are under occupying their home will be affected by the bedroom tax.

If you think that you are not under occupying you need to tell the local council and your landlord. This might be because you have more people living at home than we know about.

If you need to move to a smaller property you can register with a national web site called HomeSwapper on www. homeswapper.co.uk HomeSwapper will use the information you give to help match you to suitable properties.

Or you could register with your local council for choice based lettings. Here you can apply to join the housing register, search for affordable properties to rent and make bids on those properties that interest you.

If your benefit is cut you will have to pay the difference to your landlord between your housing benefit and

Book Review

Joyland by Stephen King


STAMPED with a "Hard-Case crime" logo, this book should set alarms bells ringing but do not be fooled. King has really made an effort to create characters that the reader cares about.

Our hero Devin Jones, broken-hearted over his ex, takes a job at Joyland and throws himself into his work at the fun-park.

He is suddenly surrounded by fascinating characters, such as Lane, Tom and Erin, and his friends join him in a quest for truth that becomes a coming-of-age tale.

Devin becomes immersed into a small-town world, with its own language, its friends and foes and its mysterious dark secret.

The story focuses on "that short stretch of North Carolina beach that lies between the town of Heaven's Bay and Joyland..." but that beach and "the carny life" become a stage for questions about desire, murder and the



meaning of living itself.

The tale manages to be both dramatic and exciting. Rather than a narrative being undermined and eventually completely derailed with supernatural goings-on (similar to The Tommyknockers) the supernatural serves the plot rather than the other way around.

I would recommend this book, and put it among King's greatest books.

Wildlife in my garden

WELCOMING WILDLIFE

AFTER a long and very interesting phone call with an enthusiastic reader yesterday, I thought it would be worth recapping on the basics of wildlife gardening, so that we are all familiar with what to do.

To recap, the main components to have in any wildlife garden are water, many different types of flowers/shrubs/trees, deadwood and grass of differing lengths. Water, whether in the form of ponds or an upturned dustbin lid get quickly colonised by a wide variety of life.

Flowers/trees and shrubs need to be varied with flowers of differing shapes/sizes and fragrance, and that flower at as many different times of year as possible. Remember that some insect have different length tongues so those with short tongues need open flat flowers so they can get to the nectar. Obviously they would struggle with long trumpet shaped flowers.

Deadwood is great, but don't just have it in the shade under some trees. Have deadwood in the sun and semi shade too as that could attract an entire new set of creatures.

Finally, use grass of differing lengths. Sounds simple but it's so effective. If you have a good population of singing grasshoppers and crickets etc, it indicates good grassland management.

And what better name to give this bunch of lads than the very fearful Baskerville Hounds after the famous sleuth Sherlock Holmes' novel, Hound of the Baskervilles.

They worked strenuously

to first, lay and build a track and then to assemble a team. They acquired permission from Oxford City Council who granted them use of the area in Rivermead Road now known as the wildlife conservation area. The cost of all the work was born by the founders and a few riders chipped in with weekly subscriptions.

Coey Major went on to become a professional motorcycle speedway rider and rode for teams such as Newcastle, Aldershot and Oxford Cheetahs.
