The quality of the course was very good, and I feel I've gained a lot of up-todate knowledge and practical experience. The tutor, Tommy Tucker, is very professional; he used slides and videos to explain important information clearly, and used mannequins to demonstrate how to do first aid effectively.

Everyone on the course enjoyed his teaching style very much. There were nine students in the class so we had a lot of time practicing first aid skills on mannequins under Tommy's guidance, such as resuscitation, CPR and choking.

The handbook the tutor gave us is very easy to use and so useful for refreshing our

We did written multiple choice tests and practical role play at the end of the course before receiving certificates. I learnt a lot and hope I don't have to use it, but I know now if a situation arises I can handle it. I would recommend this course to everyone.

Exclusive interview with Stranglers front-man Jean-Jacques "JJ" Burnel

JJ BURNEL has been the bassist in one of the biggest and best bands to come out of Britain for 40 years, and has caused controversy, intrigue and wonderment wherever he's been.

The Ruby Anniversary tour salutes a remarkable achievement for the band, and I caught up with the music maestro on the day of the Oxford gig.

I've noticed that you've gigged quite lot in Oxford, why's that? Well first of all there's demand and as a musician you prefer to go where they want you, and also because it's an important city.

We have quite a demographic of people who want to see us and it's not only people of our age. A lot of much younger people come to see us now—we're generally across the board everywhere we play now.

What do you like about Oxford? Well it's a beautiful city and the

audience comes. In the old days we used to go to places where no one wanted us and the police would come round to throw us out, or we'd get people bottling us or attacking us. So it's changed, and you know, we're kind of grateful.

What's the tour bus like?

We don't have a tour bus, the road crew have one. We look after them. The people who work for us are the real stars because without them we wouldn't operate. It's always been

What does this tour in particular mean to you?

It means...well it's a celebration of 40 years and still standing. Most of the other people are dead. It's a big "finger in the air" to everyone else. We were so heavily criticised and so slagged off in the early days but we were more successful than the Clash and Sex Pistols.

We sold more records because we worked harder. We went to people, we went to little villages, and those people bought our records. Whereas The Clash and the Pistols just stayed in London and had huge publicity. They were on the front cover with nice clothes and everything and we didn't, so we kind of always felt justified, or vindicated that we'd been allowed to carry on and do what we liked best: make

What's kept the band and the fans together for 40 years?

Well I have a few theories on that. We are one of the best bands to ever come out of Britain and we haven't been straitjacketed so we've been allowed to experiment more than any other band and when we've had success we've perversely gone the opposite direction. So we're kind of organic.

Like when you chose to release La Folie after the success of Golden Brown?

Yeah, a seven minute song entirely in French just to annoy the record company. That's kind of us and it's held us in good stead.

These days people don't take risks as much. Everyone wants success straight away. You see X-Factor, Pop Idol etc and these people have got talent but they're not masters of their own destiny. Someone else is controlling them like puppets. No one has ever controlled us.

I think a lot of people identify with that, and a lot of younger people see us now because they're cynical about all the manufactured music and artists. They can see that we've made so many mistakes and done all we weren't leaving because we had the wrong things that people wouldn't a contract and were there for our dare do now, yet we're still surviving and outselling everyone in the UK and Europe.

Everything is short-term nowadays...?

Yeah it is. But a lot of that is to do with the actual business. Because the music business got taken over by accountants and they only think in the short term. So they weren't risking their own money, like some entrepreneurs were.

Blokes like Chris Blackwell, who started Island records, didn't make

any money at first from Bob Marley or U2 for years but he believed in them. Nowadays if six months go by and they haven't recouped the money, you're out, goodbye. So they don't give the chance to someone to develop.

What does Golden Brown mean to you? I know what people think it means but I've heard you say before that it's about failings, would you go along with that? Well, no. In general terms it's

about drugs. About heroin to be specific. I won't beat about the bush. Sometimes I do but sometimes I lie when people ask me about Golden Brown because I can't be bothered because it's a boring question... but what it means to me...the story about Golden Brown is that it was a song that we created and the record company didn't wanna release it.

They said you can't dance to it, it doesn't sound punky blah blah blah. So we invoked a clause in our contract with the record company and forced them to release it. They released it before Christmas thinking it would just drown in that tsunami of Christmas releases but it didn't.

We touched on it before but why did you choose an aggressive name for the band?

Good question. One night we had another fiasco in a bar somewhere in the really early days and it was a disaster. Every night when we did get a chance to play it was a disaster.

How was it a disaster?

Because people didn't like us. For instance one landlord, one night pulled the plug on our set. So we plugged it back in, and he pulled it out. And it went on like this for a while with us playing a few bars and him pulling it out and eventually he called the police, and the police came and by this time it was smaller audience but they were thinking this is fantastic, this is entertaining!

So the police asked us to leave the premises and we told them that £25. Anyway it was one of these nights and we were backstage and there was a film that we'd just been to see called The Boston Strangler. So I don't know, I just sat down and said 'Ah the stranglers have done it again' and I quite liked it.

Thermal Imaging on Rose Hill

MEMBERS of Rose Hill and Iffley Low Carbon (RHILC) were out and about taking thermal images of local houses in January.

Thermal images can help identify 'hot spots' on the outside of a house which show where heat is being lost. The aim was to help people take action to cut down their energy costs. Approximately 2,500 leaflets were distributed asking local residents if they were interested in having their house imaged. Nearly 100 said yes.

RHILC borrowed a thermal imaging camera from Oxford Community Action Group and members were trained how to use it. To get a good image it needed to be a cold dry evening. There were not many of these in the wettest January on record!


We organised a timetable for the fortnight we had the camera, but many evenings had to be called off because it was too wet. Luckily we were able to borrow the camera for an extra week and we managed to get everyone done.

People received their images either by email or delivered by hand. On Saturday 15 February, everyone involved was invited to a meeting where they could have individual help interpreting their images.

There were also presentations from experts giving advice about ways to insulate your house and cutting down on heating bills.

The Association has on occasions donated money to various new projects such as the Rose Hill and Donnington Advice Centre. In tandem with councillors the new Rose Hill Choir benefitted from donations to purchase a new electronic key board helping the choir to entertain the community throughout the area and enjoy themselves during practice sessions.

IN THE past four months over 400 hours have been given to the project by 35 volunteers.

Easter Bunny Card Make a colourful and cute card for Easter!

What you need:

- A4 card paper
- Coloured craft paper
- Thicker scrap paper or card (for template)
- Pencil Ruler
- Scissors
- Glue
- Hole punch Felt tip pen
- Wiggle eyes

1. Sketch out a bunny template on cardboard or some thicker scrap paper. Draw a pear shape by drawing a larger circle then a small circle on top of it, smoothing out the curves to make a bunny shape (you could use two different-size cups as a guide).

Draw rabbit ears on the top of the head. Cut out this bunny shape to use as a template. Including the ears, the template





should be approx. 14cm tall.

2. Place template on coloured paper. Trace a line around it and cut it out. Cut three strips from different coloured paper about 0.5-1cm wide. Glue them on the bottom half of the bunny. Trim the edges.

Using the hole punch, punch some holes in some coloured paper and use the cut-outs to decorate your Easter Bunny. Cut out two shapes in a contrasting colour for the insides of the ears.

3. Fold a sheet of A4 card paper in half widthways. Glue your bunny to the card so that the top of the ears touch the fold. Keeping the card folded, cut around the bunny through both layers of paper.

To finish off the bunny glue on wiggle eyes and draw the nose and mouth with a coloured felt tip pen or similar.

You now have a cute stand-up Easter Bunny card to use as a decoration or send as an Easter greeting to a friend.


What's more, left alone with grandma, George starts to suspect that the horrid old lady might be a witch.




