THE BIG 100

MRS FLORENCE TOMLINSON, who has lived in Rose Hill for 67 years, recently celebrated her one-hundredth birthday surrounded by friends and family.

She spoke of her joy at receiving a card from the Queen: "I can't believe it, I feel very excited for the people around me, they've been waiting for it, I held it up and they all clapped because when you're at my age, you never know if you're going to reach it."

Her daughter Helen, who lives in Oregon in the US said: "I'm not surprised, she's resilient, and she recovers from everything, from it all!"

Having been born originally in South Shields during World War I, Florence told the story of her birth: "A German airship came over and when they brought it down, all of the excitement brought it on, the Doctor came in and took off his coat and bag and said I wouldn't survive the night; so you do get a laugh out of that!"

Florence, who moved into Alice and Margaret house seven years ago, spoke of the first time she acquired a house in Rose Hill: "I was cycling down to the allotment to get a cabbage, and I saw a house down there, I turned around, went to the Town Hall and two weeks later we had the key to 42 Lenthall Rd! And it was fabulous."

"My husband had an allotment for 42 years" said Florence: "I loved the allotment, we never bought vegetables or fruit and my favourite thing to grow was rhubarb, we always made rhubarb crumble with lovely custard." Florence also spoke about her other love of dancing: "I used to love dancing, I won second prize for the quick-step once, and went twice a week, those were the good times."

When reflecting back on her life in full, Florence said: "I made it my business to have a full life and not mope about, it's been an experience, a great experience, I haven't done much but what I have is what I've wanted."

EVERY week, approximately 300 kilos of food gets delivered to the Rose Hill community centre.

This food, supplied by charities Oxford Food Bank and Fareshare, is sorted by volunteers and distributed to pensioners, the junior youth club kitchen team and families or individuals in need within the community.

Every item is surplus food, food which would otherwise be sent to landfill sites by supermarkets. Tesco is one of the supermarkets which gives food to this surplus initiative. By using the surplus food in the community, the children who come to JYC can eat a fantastic healthy meal, and elderly residents have nutritious food to eat. One resident of Alice and Margaret House said: "The shops we have round here only do certain things. I went in there the other day and I couldn't get anything I wanted. But then the surplus food delivery arrived and I was able to make something nice. There is lots of fish, fruit and yoghurts. And there are ready meals which is a dinner for me - I just put it in the oven"

Following a report by Good Food Oxford, which noted figures regarding food poverty and healthy eating worries, a film was made to show how staff prepare and serve amazing nutritious dinners and desserts for JYC using surplus food.





In February we had a brilliant talk from Barbara Hammond of the Low Carbon Hub about their new Community Share Offer in local renewable energy. They are putting solar panels on Rose Hill Primary School so that it will get cheaper electricity. They are also developing a hydro-scheme at nearby Sandford Weir, returning it to its historic use as a provider of clean energy. This will generate enough electricity for about 450 local homes. On 4 March, we screened Robert Kenner's Merchants of Doubt at the Community Centre. It's a powerful film about the way oil companies deliberately throw doubt on the dangers of climate change so that they can continue making their billions by polluting the planet. 48 people came and most gave their views at a really interesting discussion afterwards.

In March we also supported Oxford City

Council's Affordable Warmth campaign by distributing their leaflets to 600 non-council homes in Rose Hill. These show how people with disabilities can claim up to £2,500 grants to save energy in their homes. Ring the Affordable Warmth helpline on 0800 107 0044 if you think you could be eligible.

Our next big event is a film-screening and panel discussion about renewable energy in

Rose Hill. It's at 7.30pm on Friday 3 June at Rose Hill Community Centre. We'll be showing part of Welcome to the Renewable Revolution. a documentary about successful renewable energy in Germany. This will be followed by a panel discussion with experts looking at different aspects of how we can develop renewables in Rose Hill and Iffley. Please come and add your voice!


We're back!

ROSE HILL TENANTS AND RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION

SINCE the last Rose Hill News article in March, the **Tenants and Residents** Association have secured new funding for the next six months from Oxford City Council and Greensquare Group. This came as a result of agreeing to changes to the Constitution, mainly concerned with updating ever changing legislation.

The RHTRA have been involved with local government officers in the complete updating and resurfacing of Nowell Road throughout the entire length. We continue to monitor all roads, paths and verges on Rose Hill with funding in place to repair other roads.

We are pressing the Oxfordshire County Council to provide long overdue traffic lights at the junction of Ashurst Way and Oxford Road/Rose Hill and consider their installation a priority.

Officers and Committee members continue to attend Health Forums on behalf of the people of Rose Hill in an effort to secure the promised Doctor's Surgery in the new Community Centre. The AGEUK nail cutters are now trained to support all clients over the age of 50 including those suffering with Diabetes.


