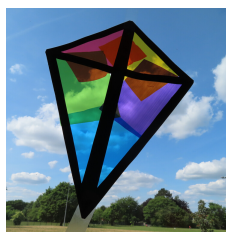

RECYCLING & WASTE UPDATES **Oxford Direct Services**

If there's an individual in your household with suspected or confirmed Covid-19 in self-isolation, they need to store their waste (e.g. used tissues, disposable cleaning cloths, etc.) following these steps:

- 1) Double bag all waste
- 2) Sort separately from other waste for 72 hours
- 3) After 72 hours, dispose in the green rubbish bin with the lid closed

Garden waste collections have resumed. In order to run this service more effectively, collection weeks have been reversed. Garden waste bins and brown eco sacks now need to be put out for collection on your green bin or lilac sack collection day permanently

Bulky waste collections have restarted. We're expecting a longer waiting time than usual as we get the service back up and running. To begin with, we're asking residents to only use the service if it's essential - www.oxford.gov.uk/recycling

Oxfordshire County Council have reopened recycling centres for essential visits and social distancing will be in place to keep everyone safe. Take a look at their website for new site rules - www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/wastereopenquestions



FRIENDS OF RIVERMEAD

Rivermead Nature Park is an oasis of nature just off of Rivermead Road in Rose Hill.

The park is enjoyed by walkers and families and is a peaceful space to relax, exercise & learn about the wildlife & plants.

A year ago, access to over half of the woodland was fenced off by Oxford University as a response to anti-social behaviour.

Concerned residents got in touch with Rose Hill News about the reduced access and from then on public meetings were organised and a local community group called: Friends of Rivermead, was formed.

Local resident and member of Friends of Rivermead, Jason, explained:

"For an urban area it is a wild space, it attracts wild life, and generations of residents have enjoyed it. Access to open space is key. The University has promised to re-open but work to make trees safe has been slowed by the lock down and the fence is still up. To show the strength of local feeling and help the conversation with the University. we are asking residents to fill in a survey. There is also the hope of having a footpath through the Park to Iffley."
